

**Grant Reporting HEERF II and HEERF III for Quarter Ending March 31, 2022- FINAL
Published Date: April 8, 2022**

The Higher Education Emergency Relief Funds (HEERF II and HEERF III) are authorized by the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2021 (CRRSAA), Public Law 116-260, signed into law on Dec. 27, 2020 and the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Public Law 117-2, signed into law on March 11, 2021. In total, the CRRSAA authorizes \$81.88 billion, and ARP authorizes \$39.6 billion in support for education in addition to the \$30.75 billion expeditiously provided last spring through the Coronavirus Aid, Recovery, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, Public Law 116-136.

Bais Medrash Dexter Park has been allocated \$41,258 under CRRSAA to be used as Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students. Bais Medrash Dexter Park has disbursed \$14,898 from the Student Portion of SAIHE and \$39,102 from the Institution portion of SAIHE as grants to 42 eligible students between January 1, 2022 and March 31, 2022.

The total number of students eligible to receive SAIHE funding in Bais Medrash Dexter Park in this quarter is 97. This includes the number of eligible degree seeking and non-degree seeking students who were enrolled for the Fall 2021 semester.

The method used by Bais Medrash Dexter Park to prioritize students with exceptional need was based on the following criteria:

In the quarter ending on 12/31/2021, Pell Grant recipients were prioritized and were the first students to receive SAIHE Grants of \$300 or \$850 based on dependency status. After Pell recipients were awarded, SAIHE Grants of \$200 or \$730 were awarded to non-Pell recipient students based on dependency status.

In this quarter, students that demonstrated additional need received an additional grant in the range of \$2,000 -\$6,000, depending on need.

In this quarter non-matriculated independent students were awarded grants of \$400.

Students were instructed that their Emergency Financial Aid Grants are non-taxable and may be used for any component of their cost of attendance or for emergency costs that arise due to coronavirus, such as tuition, food, housing, health care (including mental health care) or child care.
